PROCEDURE FOR CHECKING BOOKS OUT OF THE LIBRARY -- Every book and video has a card in a pocket inside the cover. To check out the material, just take the card and put it in the metal box by the bookcase. To check it back in, find the card and put it back inside the cover. Magazines also have a card for each issue, but usually they are in a pocket in the binder holding a year's worth of magazines.

Norm Shirk helped his boys with their pine wood derby cars. Restricted by size and weight limits, Norm came up with two designs. One was a pickup truck and the other was a bullet shaped car. If I got my facts right, I think he said they won a race and a design award. Good going, Dad!

Dan Pugilese impressed us with the SUV he made of contrasting woods. Never one to go half-measure, his SUV came with a trailer hauling a four-wheeler. While I'm already sitting there feeling inferior, he had the nerve to throw sand in my face by pulling out another one! This one was pulling a trailer with a motorcycle. Both were up to his usual high standard of quality.

Steve Yauch brought his folding jig. Used on both his table saw and router table, it is used in conjunction with vertical panel raising bits he has. Pretty smart design.

He also brought the \$30.00 Dust-B-Gone dust mask he bought. Handy in that it won't fog up your glasses and is washable. Same rules apply with the mask as with router.

Dale Osborne showed us the sanding blocks he made. The neat thing about them was that on each end he screwed a binder clamp on for quick and easy changing of paper.

<u>Program</u>

Dennis Furlow gave us an impressive program on Shaker oval boxes. With him he had about twelve

boxes going from tiny to pony holding size. Each one has a corresponding number like buying shoes.

Dennis said he gets his materials from The Home Shop in Charlotte, Michigan. Phone number is 517-543-5325. It is a lot easier just to order the wood and save yourself the trouble of trying to mill the wood down to the thiness required. He also gets his tacks and tops and bottoms from the same supplier.

To get started Dennis makes the box part first. He uses a template to mark the fingers for the band or side of the box and cuts them with a bandsaw. Then the fingers are soaked in hot water and trimmed to final shape with a utility knife. Tack holes are drilled and the other end is sanded to a bevel. Tacks are applied by hammering against an anvil to curl the end of the tack.

The next step is to mark and cut the bottom. Holes are then drilled around the edge to hold pegs that fasten the band to bottom. The top is done the same way using the box as a sizing guide.

Don't count on this description to make a shaker box. Space limits the steps required to do the right job. Suffice it to say Dennis is the expert. If you have any questions he the go to guy. If for some reason you didn't get the printout of instructions he had I'm sure he would be glad to bring some more next meeting.

Then we got to play jig-saw-puzzle, as many pieces had their numbers relating to the pattern either obscured or missing. We ended up with odd pieces, so we cut and fitted a few new ones.

This panel will be a beauty. If we'd had a good turnout, we might have finished it up for her that morning!

We thank Christina for her hospitality and confidence to let us diddle around in the shop without fussing over us. It was great fun, and I left with resolve to sign up for her stained glass education course.
