General Discussions

Dale Osborne asked about the pros and cons or left-tilt vs. right-tilt tables saws. This is one of those perennially controversial questions, so it generated a lot of discussion. Whether the opinions expressed were helpful to Dale is another question.

Bob Furlow asked if there is an internet index of all woodworking magazines. Each magazine has its own

indexing, of course, but he wanted a single index. Someone brought up WoodFind, which is a subscription service. Here is a review:

Platform: Windows

Developer: WOODFIND (http://home.kendra.com/woodfind/)

Price: \$56.95, \$18.95 for yearly updates **Reviewed By**: Bill Kovalick, WoodBin

To put it simply, WOODFIND is a program for finding information in woodworking magazines. At the heart of it is an index that contains references to articles, tips, and letters from 23 woodworking magazines. That amounts to 1200+ issues and more than 26,000 entries! What is really impressive is that this index has been manually updated every year since the early 1990's.

I should make it clear up front that the WOODFIND index does not contain the actual woodworking articles and letters - only references or summaries of them. You'll still have to track down the magazines yourself. All the major woodworking magazines are indexed so unless you subscribe to the East Podunk Woodworking Times, your favorite magazine is likely to be covered by WOODFIND.

It was proposed that we subscribe to the service for the library.

Craftsman radial arm saws are being recalled because of a problem with the blade guard. If you have one and want to find out if it is included, go to the Sears web site for more info. If yours in included in the recall, you simply fill out a form and Sears will send a replacement blade guard

Bring Back

Mike Pregent brought a pair of new 12" wooden shop clamps for this month's drawing. You can't get enough clamps, so lots of folks bought tickets for them, including Mike. Wouldn't you know that Mike won again!? However, he is a gentleman, so he put it back in and Owen had another ticket drawn. This time, Dan Walker won it.

Library

No news this month.

Show & Tell

Norm Shirk showed his self-designed drill press table and fence. He used 2 pieces of birch plywood with oak banding, a laminate top, T tracks and an aluminum fence. He said the hardest part was cutting the T track to match

the bevel on the edge banding. His fence was a nice piece of work and not nearly so over-engineered as his submission last month!

Dan Henry showed his MDF skill-saw guide. It is simply a wide piece of MDF glued on a piece of ¼" plywood. The sole of the skillsaw rides against the MDF. Initially, you trim the plywood with the saw, so the edge is exactly where the cut will always be with that saw. Someone suggested gluing sandpaper on the bottom of the jig to help it stay put. Dan advised that if you make one of your own, be sure to make it wide enough so the saw will pass by your clamps.

Jack Edgecomb had a jig for cutting raised panels on the tablesaw, especially small pieces, and for cutting the narrow side of a panel. He demonstrated this jig last year (or was it the year before?) in a battle of the panel raisers when he was pitted against Walter Schuster. Jack also showed us a circle-cutting jig for his router. He cut the dadoe for a glass clock face by using different bits in the same jig. Next, Jack showed a jig for drilling consistently spaced holes, like when installing shelf pins, and butt hinge template for routing hinges into doors.

Charles Grant brought a miniature bench (about 1 ½" long) he makes for a lady who packages them and sells them to craft stores. He makes 200 - 1,000 at a time, using a sled on his tablesaw. He cuts grooves on the ends of a stack of small pieces, then trims the notched ends off. The notched pieces become the legs of the benches, while the remaining piece becomes the top. Very clever.

Dan Walker, who was here for the first time after hearing about us at DNR saw, brought in his Kreg jig. He uses it extensively for making face frames.

Your faithful, long-suffering secretary [Earl Ashurst] showed his favorite jig, a piece of rope, which he uses for lashing the hose from his dust collector to various pieces of machinery to catch dust. I think it was a clever demonstration, even though many of you tried to hoot me down for such audacity.

Charles Grant and Norm Shirk each received \$10 for their Show & Tell offering. We have a drawing to award \$10 for each 5 submissions. Bring something to show and perhaps you will be paid, too. [Hey, Charles, this could get profitable! ed.]
