John Stankus won some of the 50 board feet of a new wood called Lyptus that Hogan's (formerly known as Paxton's Beautiful Woods) so generously donated via Jim Dawson. As stated in the brochure provided – "Lyptus is a hardwood that is stronger than hard maple, yet matures in about 15 years. That's four or five times faster than cherry or mahogany. Lyptus sustainably managed forests assure consistent quality, supply and a pleasantly predictable price." It is grown in Brazil. More of the wood will be raffled off at the September meeting.

Show and Tell

Phil Timmons showed some scrolled wood pictures and scrolled Gibraltar (a Corian like product that is easy to scroll). Some were in the shape of Texas with names attached.

John Stankus got a midi-lathe and told of some of the results on his first attempts at turning. He showed a handle he turned for a chisel.

Munawar Soomro brought in a bench-top router table that he made for his Craftsman, but the Craftsman didn't suit him so he bought a Porter Cable.

Steve Yauch showed a split turning and explained a little about how to do one.

Bob Jones brought in his new Black and Decker laser level. He also commented that Black and Decker has bought out Porter Cable.

Bob Jones won The Show and Tell prize.

Program

Bob Staebell – maker of fine humidors, gave the program for August. He showed some boxes and some inlays, explained how he made the joints, and displayed several of the jigs he has made. **Bob** explained how to square up a box and how to glue them tightly using ½" nylon rope, a steel bar, and corner pieces to hold the rope in place. He uses Tite Bond for gluing.

Bob had many of his beautiful humidors on display.

Who's Who?

The one he is most proud of is a 2'x4' box he made for a customer to hold his computer wires and other devices and he could use it as footrest as well.

The following e-mail was received from a traveling Dale Osborne. Yesterday I visited a bookstore in Matamata, NZ, where parts of the Lord of the Rings trilogy were filmed. The store had the largest display of magazines I've ever seen. 
