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Program

The program for September was on Bandsaw Use and Tune-up given by Howard Hale of Woodcraft. Highlights follow:

The number one problem with a bandsaw is the blade. You will need a good blade to get your bandsaw to perform well. The type of blade your using determines if you should be using blocks or rollers. Cool blocks are better if you are using 3/16" or 1/8" blade. Make sure that the cool blocks or rollers do not touch the blade on either side. If you can put a dollar bill between the blade and the block/roller and it slides in easily and stays there, your spacing is good. Best to just use 3/16" blades and don't buy the 1/8" blades, they are hard to keep straight in the bandsaw. Better silicone blades do not require as much tension as a cheap steel blade. Good rule of thumb is to have 3 teeth in the wood at any time. Too many and the blades get hot and will not remove waste. Most people run too much tension. Most woodworkers do not untension their bandsaw blades, we will usually forget to tension it and keeping the tension on does not hurt the blade or the wheels. The books tell you to take your saw apart to be sure the wheels are lined up, there is no need to do this with American designed bandsaws. When adjusting the top wheel, micro adjustment are recommended. If the blade is not falling off the wheels, leave it alone.

The fence will need adjustment to the drift of the blade. Take a piece of square wood and draw some straight line on it. Saw free hand down a line and stop the saw halfway through (do not move the board). Take a pencil and mark the edge of the board to the table. Once you remove everything, you have a track line. Adjust the fence to that line. Then put the fence next to the board and saw along another line and check to see if it will cut straight down that line. Every blade has a different track angle and you will need to adjust it every time you change blades. If the fence has to be moved more than 1/16", something is really wrong.



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
