Joe Polich made this box from wenge, sapele and maple.



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
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Jay Stearns used quilted maple, walnut and mesquite for this box.

Bodie Pyndrus made two boxes, the one on the right is made from Bradford pear which he also used on the sliding top of the box on the left.



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
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Ron Bauman made this bandsaw box from a red cedar log.

Steve Yauch used quilted maple, walnut and mesquite for these two boxes.







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
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
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Dale's box was the winner of the \$50 1st place prize!

Ed Mastin turned two boxes for this challenge. The one on the left is made with cherry staves and the one on the right is a segmented bowl kit.





