Joe Polich modified two General Sing pen kits to fit this deskset he made in high school over 50 years ago. He used mahogany to match the desk he made several years ago.



Jim Polanco made this ambrosia maple occasional table for his wife from wood he actually found at a Home Depot back in NJ.



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Jay Stearns made this kitchen helper stool for toddlers. It has an adjustable deck for when the kids get older.

He used Valerian screws from Westeros and it breaks down for storage.



Michael Bosley made this scratch stock from an old saw plate. The profile was shaped using a Dremel tool to shape the profile to fit cabinet doors for member Ed Mastin. The edges were sharpened on a diamond plate.

The cutter fits into a groove in a 2 x 4 and secured with a thumbscrew. The cutter is adjustable with taps from a hammer, then secured with the thumbscrew. It is used like a molding plane along the side of the cabinet door.
