Britt Baumel asked whether it was preferable to use butcher block conditioner or mineral oil on a cutting board. The group agreed that using butcher block conditioner was preferable to mineral oil.

Jim Polanco shared that he was working on an antique from Honduras that needs reconditioning. Jim was unsure of the old finish and removal. The group suggested it is most likely shellac or lacquer and to start with trying alcohol, then if not successful to try lacquer thinner or paint stripper.

Camille Watanabe is drilling a 1/4" hole in 6 ft tall board at the end and

needed to know how to do so. The group suggested trying a router bit or building/buying a drill guide.

Dennis Ogren asked if tung oil was food safe. The group said yes if it was allowed to fully dry and cure.

Phillip Weber was offering a free pen lathe he was no longer using. A member was happy to receive it.

Kelly Geer shared that Urban Tree Merchants was having another Makers Meetup Saturday, April 22 from 11-3.

Susan Walters shared that the Rockler card scraper she recently tried was not very useful.
