Bob Zeigler showed us the bar-height chair he made out of oak and pecan wood. This was the first chair he has made; it was inspired by the Scott Phillips Show.



Brian O'Donnell shared with us a folding chair he created out of oak and black walnut dowels that was inspired from a piece he found in his Dad's shop.



Eric Roberts created this bench with Beautiful Gingerbread Trim from his inlaws 1885 Victorian home that burned down.

Rick Maiella showed the group the Director's Chair he made out of Western Cedar. He is making 16 of these for a customer who plans to engrave the back with custom logos.



Ed Mastin shared the stool he used to take with him on outdoor photoshoots - back when he was a photographer!



Dan Wenger made this stool to compliment a 10ft balsa board that is on display in his home!

Gary Vaughn created a classic windsor chair. It is painted because it was made from 3 different types of wood: The legs and arms are maple, the seat is northern white pine and the upper part is made with white oak.



Bodie Pyndus made this red oak bench. The legs are cookies, and are held together with Walnut dowels. It is finished with Johnson Paste Wax. His second bench was made with Bradford Pear and Walnut.

Susan Walters showed us her very first Mortise and Tenon project. The bench is made with cherry wood and polycotton shaker tape; finished with danish oil and paste wax on the arms.

### Beads of Courage

**B** eads of Courage is a supportive care program for children coping with serious illness. The participating children receive a colorful bead for each illness-related experience they have, serving as symbols of the courage each child shows throughout arduous their treatment. critical milestones in For their treatment journey they receive handmade one-ofa-kind glass beads that are donated by members of the International Society of Glass Beadmakers.

Our role as woodworkers is a simple one: to create and donate wooden boxes for these children to keep their treasured beads in. As they endure their arduous treatment process, the children gain strength and courage from these tangible symbols of the love and support of the community around them. What better purpose could we find as woodworkers?

The NTWA has sponsored an annual box building for Beads of Courage since its adoption in 2019.




Workshop #1: Joinery - Mortise & Tenon



Now in our 32nd year, The North Texas Woodworkers Association was founded in April 1991.


